รู้ลึก รู้จริง! แนวข้อสอบ

แบบฝึกหัด O-NET ทั้ง 5 ชุดนี้ แต่งโดยครูชาวอังกฤษที่มีประสบการณ์ การสอนภาษาอังกฤษในเมืองไทยมากว่า 10 ปี และครูกุล (ผู้แปล) ซึ่งเป็นคนที่รัก ในภาษาอังกฤษ และมีโอกาสได้ใช้ภาษาอังกฤษมาตลอด และปัจจุบันเปิดโรงเรียนสอน ภาษาอังกฤษมา 10 ปี เช่นกัน

ครูกุลเห็นว่าในปัจจุบันนักเรียนเรียนภาษาอังกฤษมากมาย แต่มักจะประสบ ปัญหาในเรื่องการทำข้อสอบต่าง ๆ จึงอยากแนะนำว่า การเรียนภาษาอังกฤษ ผู้เรียน ต้องรักในภาษา และอย่ามองเป็นเรื่องยาก เราต้องเข้าใจในบริบทที่เป็นภาษาต่างประเทศ สำนวนการใช้หลาย ๆ ครั้งจะไม่สามารถแปลเป็นภาษาไพยอย่างตรง ๆ เพราะจะทำให้ ไม่สามารถเข้าใจได้ นักเรียนนอกจากจะต้องเรียนไวยากรณ์ภาษาอังกฤษให้เข้าใจที่มาที่ไป และกฎต่าง ๆ ยังคงต้องฝึกอ่านเนื้อหาที่เป็นภาษาอังกฤษบ่อย ๆ ไม่ว่าจะจากข่าวสาร นิตยสาร หนังสืออ่านนอกเวลา เพื่อเป็นการเพิ่มพูนความรู้และคำศัพท์ ฝึกพูดและฝึกเขียนเพื่อให้ได้ ใช้หลักไวยากรณ์ที่ได้เรียนมา และฝึกทำข้อสอบหลาย ๆ แนว เพื่อความข้านาญ

ครูกุลจึงอยากให้นักเรียนใช้แนวข้อสอบทั้ง 5 ชุดนี้เป็นเพียงการฝึกฝนเพิ่มเติม เพื่อจะได้รู้ว่าเรื่องใดยังเป็นจุดอ่อนสำหรับนักเรียนที่จะต้องเพิ่มพูนความรู้ เพราะในการ ทดสอบภาษาอังกฤษระดับมัธยม 6 นั้น จำเป็นต้องมีความรู้เรื่องของคำศัพท์ สำนวนต่าง ๆ ไวยากรณ์ และหลาย ๆ ครั้งความรู้รอบตัวต่าง ๆ จะช่วยให้เราทำข้อสอบได้ดี

แบบฝึกหัดนี้ผู้จัดทำจึงพยายามหาเรื่องราวที่หลากหลายเพื่อให้นักเรียนได้รู้จักคำศัพท์ ใหม่ ๆ อีกทั้งภาษาที่ใช้เป็นภาษาอังกฤษที่ใช้จริงในชีวิตประจำวัน แต่ครูกุลพยายามแปล โดยใช้ภาษาไทย ไม่ใช่เพียงแค่แปลจากตัวหนังสืออย่างตรงไปตรงมา และหลายครั้งเห็นว่า ถ้ามีรูปประกอบจะช่วยให้นักเรียนเห็นภาพชัดเจนมากขึ้น
